

Paul Doyle:

There's one thing that you can control when you're accused of a crime and that's the lawyer you hire. I can look at my clients in the eyes and tell them, "You hire me, you're going to be able to sleep easy at night because you know you've got somebody who's going to fight for you. You know you have somebody who's at the top of his craft, if not in the state of Texas, in the country." When someone learns that they have been accused of a crime, there is literally no worse feeling. Many of these clients, it's the first time they've ever been in this situation before. They're concerned, they're scared and they want somebody who can protect their freedom.

Trevor Sharon:

We have a policy here that we don't just tell people what they want to hear. We tell them the truth, but at the same time, we give them the confidence of hiring one of the top attorneys in this area.

I was at the Harris County DA's office for quite some time. I was there for over seven years. I had the opportunity to be exposed to every type of potential crime somebody could be accused of. With that experience, I'm able to look at people who are accused of crimes and dissect the accusations. These details can become important because it'll tell you what the soft spot or potential weaknesses of a case are.

Trevor Sharon:

It's motivating that someone places their life or their trust with you. We thrive under pressure and we embrace it fully. Hard work is especially important in these cases because a lot of times evidence goes away. It gets destroyed. You need to hire an attorney that's going to get in front of the case and work hard immediately.

We don't have to rush to judgment. Many times law enforcement does that. If you're patient, you see exactly what the playing field is, then you can get the truth out about any potential case, any potential client in the most effective manner.

I think there's a lack of empathy. Prosecutors and judges, sometimes they just want to check their boxes and not think about the human cost of it, I think is terrible, inhumane.

Paul Doyle:

Many times prosecutor's perspective of a case may be somewhat misunderstood, but it is being filtered by what they're being told from law enforcement. So you have to educate a prosecutor and understand number one, where they're coming from. Having been a prosecutor, I know how to do it. I know how prosecutors think. I have to help educate them as to what the actual facts are. Many of my clients are referred to me by lawyers. Many of my clients happen to be lawyers. You can read advertisements. You can see billboards. You can get letters in the mail, but when the lawyers within our community are sending their personal business to me, I believe that speaks for itself. Taking people, sending them back to their families, sending them back to their jobs, writing their names. That's something that I'm passionate about and I think that's what's driven our success.

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
